A NOTE FROM NEMONT'S CEO, MIKE KILGORE

Time flies by quickly. It seems like yesterday when my wife and I dropped our oldest daughter off at college. This spring, we attended her graduation.

Speaking of things moving quickly, let's talk about broadband. You need high-speed Internet for today's growing number of devices and online activities. What is Nemont doing to provide this? To answer that, I need to share a little bit about regulatory and technology changes, as well as a big dose of reality. First, the reality. Nemont is proud to serve some of the most remote and sparsely populated areas of the country, and we value the rural lifestyle. However, this comes with a higher cost to deliver advanced communications services, which is why the regulatory environment is so important.

Along with your patronage, we're heavily dependent on the Universal Service Fund (USF) to help cover the costs of bringing essential services to rural areas. The FCC has worked to transform this fund from a system that supported landline telephone service to one that supports broadband. New USF rules will soon take effect to lay the foundation for 10 Mbps/1 Mbps Internet speeds.

Nemont didn't wait for these new rules to develop our own broadband strategy. We started in 2005 and completed our first exchange upgrades in Glentana, Larslan, and Opheim in 2007. Since then, it's been full speed ahead — deploying fiber deeper into the network, shortening copper loops, and advancing from 1.5G cellular to 3G.We're now working on our 4G strategy, involving the deployment of entirely new wireless technology.

Our commitment to the communities we serve extends to local events and organizations. In Williston, we sponsored the Babe Ruth World Series and provided free Wi-Fi throughout the tournament. We've also launched Nemontfiber.net to help us target fiber expansion projects throughout Williston.

Since it's back-to-school time, consider upgrading your home's Internet speeds now. The students in your life will thank you for it!



MANY FACTORS CAN AFFECT YOUR INTERNET SPEED

If you've tested your Internet speed at www.speedtest.net or a similar site and it's not what you expected, your first thought might be to contact your Internet Service Provider. Keep in mind, however, that a number of things could be decreasing your Internet speed. They include:



Multiple Devices Connected Simultaneously

Does your household have multiple laptops, tablets, game consoles, and smartphones? This can reduce the overall Internet speed each device receives, since when multiple devices are connected simultaneously to the same network, they must share the available bandwidth.

Bandwidth-Demanding Applications

Applications such as streaming movies and TV shows, playing online games, and video conferencing will consume more bandwidth than things like checking email, so they can reduce your overall Internet speed.

Poor Computer Performance

The culprit for disappointing speeds could be your computer — such as an old and unstable operating system or insufficient memory. In addition, if your computer is infected with adware or spyware, you may experience diminished computer performance and a stream of pop-up ads. This will likely cause everything on your computer to work more slowly.

Insufficient Wireless Router

Wireless router specification is an important factor in your home's Internet performance. If an older router that does not support high speed is used, Internet speed will be correspondingly reduced. For example, if you are signed up for 40 Mbps service and your outdated wireless router only supports up to 10 Mbps, your Internet speed will only reach up to about 10 Mbps. Buying a new 801.11ac router is one of the best ways to make sure your network is as fast and reliable as possible.

Interference in Your Home Network

Other wireless devices — such as older cordless phones, baby monitors, some security cameras, and microwaves — can cause interference in your home, weakening your wireless router's signal and affecting your Internet speed.

THE INTERNET OF THINGS (IoT) INCLUDES MANY SMART OBJECTS

There's a lot of talk these days about the Internet of Things (IoT). But just what is it? The IoT is a collection of objects represented and connected virtually through the Internet. This means that ordinary things will be identified with electronic tags that will allow them to send information to other devices, enabling people to interact with the objects in helpful ways.

For example, a smart refrigerator might send information to your smartphone about what's inside, so you can do a grocery run on the way home from work without having to go home to check what's running low. A fitness bracelet might measure your body fat and suggest tailored fitness plans. Or a toothbrush might evaluate your brushing technique and alert you to spots in your mouth you've missed.



There seems to be no limit to possibilities offered by the IoT. A leading networking company, Cisco, estimates that the number of devices connected to the Internet will grow four times to 50 billion by 2020 from about 13 billion in 2014. Those billions and billions of connected devices — more than seven things for every person on Earth — will generate massive amounts of data that can reshape the way the world lives and works.

We can look forward to a wide range of benefits from the IoT, including:

- No more passwords! Devices will have fingerprint and retinal scanners to identify users.
- **Healthier world.** Sensors will provide information about air quality, sewers, and other locations to determine the impact of our activities on the environment.
- **Better emergency response.** Cars will send details about crashes so emergency responders can plan ahead.
- Improved health. Pill bottles will be equipped to flash lights or send messages when a patient forgets to take a dose.
- Increased safety. Buildings will have monitors that measure the severity of earthquakes, so occupants will know when to evacuate.
